St. John's Lutheran Youth Host Hunger Awareness Event

Hunger knows no season. 2013 statistic: 1 in 8 people go hungry in the world every day. That is 868 million people. In an effort to create awareness, confirmation youth hosted and served a Hunger Awareness meal event on Wednesday, March 5. St. John's members were invited to make reservations for the meal by purchasing a ticket in advance. Three menus were served. The first class meal consisted of chicken Kiev, wild rice, dinner salad, rolls, vegetable medley, dessert and beverage. The middle class meal consisted of spaghetti with meatballs, dinner salad, bread sticks, dessert and beverage. The third meal consisted of red beans, rice and water. All ticket holders were assigned a meal upon arrival with 75 percent receiving the third meal, 20 percent receiving the middle class meal, and 5 percent receiving the first class entrée. All children and confirmation youth along with their families received the third meal as well. A rich woman, poor woman dialogue and video presentation provided additional emphasis on the alarming number of people who go to bed hungry. In the last few years, there has been a reduction in the number of people who go hungry each day in over 50 countries around the world including the United States. Hunger will end when the human family changes the way it understands hunger, and defines it as both unacceptable and solvable. A gift of \$423.00 has been given to ELCA World Hunger to aid in addressing the root causes of hunger. Thank you to Shadick's Price Rite for donating all of the food for the awareness meal. Thank you to all who gave monetary donations, purchased meal tickets, cooked the meals, and gave support to the confirmation youth and families to raise awareness and become a part of the solution.

2014 Easter Message from Bishop Hoyme

Dear Friends,

Last month I got to meet one of my heroes. His name is Tony Campolo, and he has been one of the great influences in both my personal faith and my professional life. I have sat in a stadium filled with 40,000 Lutheran kids and watched this man transform kids, one life at a time, through the power of his Christian message. Last month, I got to sit in one of our congregations and experience him—and the power of his message— again.

According to Tony, his most popular message is what he calls, “It’s Friday... but Sunday’s coming!”

He tells about the old black preacher who stands up in front of his church on Good Friday and says quietly, almost at a whisper, “It’s Friday... but Sunday’s coming.”

And then he says it again, just a little louder, and the preacher keeps going.

He picks up the volume still more and shouts, “It was Friday. The cynics were looking at the world and saying, ‘As things have been so shall they be. You can’t change anything in this world; you can’t change anything.’ But those cynics didn’t know that it was only Friday. Sunday’s coming!” It was Friday and Pilate thought he had washed his hands of a lot of trouble. The Pharisees were strutting around, laughing and poking each other in the ribs. They thought they were back in charge of things. But they didn’t know it was only Friday! Sunday’s coming!

The old preacher keeps working that phrase for an hour, until at the end he is screaming, “IT’S FRIDAY! BUT SUNDAY’S COMIN!” And then, one the last time he yells, “IT’S FRIDAY.” the whole congregation screams with one voice, “BUT SUNDAY’S COMIN!”

We all know the feeling of our Fridays. Life seems not to work. Our dreams have died. Hope seems distant. It’s Friday.

But Sunday’s coming! Easter is about far more than what happens to us after we die! Easter is the promise that new life is always available. Redemption is possible. Death is not the last word. And God is GOOD... ALL THE TIME!

Pastor's News

FATHER, INTO YOUR HANDS I COMMEND MY SPIRIT...

Last month, I hope that I planted the seed about preparing for end of life issues. This month, I want to continue that discussion and introduce to you one of the ELCA's best kept secrets.

To date, I have conducted 15 memorial services (10 of which were members of St. John's) since I moved here. Whenever I meet with families who are preparing for the loss of their loved one, I offer a service that most people don't even realize we have – *Commendation of the Dying*. I am thankful that several families have already taken me up on this offer.

The service is quite simple, yet astonishingly powerful. We meet around the bed of the loved one, wherever that may be, and invite friends and family to participate in this ritual. The service begins with a welcome, then a prayer, then a litany. The litany is similar in format to the prayers of intercession in that I offer several petitions and those gathered respond with the words, "...deliver your servant." As we speak those words time and time again, they penetrate your heart and center your soul. These prayers draw all gathered closer to God and help us realize how dependent we are on God's grace in a state of vulnerability. Those are times when you can just feel faith as if it was something tangible.

The next step of the service is equally as powerful as we stand around the bed of the loved one, lay our hands on them, and pray for a peaceful deliverance. I will also trace the sign of the cross on their forehead as a symbol of resurrection and reminder of God's promises in baptism.

This ritual can very well begin the mourning process. It creates a time of closure and helps people say good-bye. It offers an opportunity to gather in community and share stories. God's presence is clearly there.

On the cross, Jesus commended his own spirit. We the church, now offer this ritual to people ready to let go. I've had people die within hours of this worship. I've had people hang on for a few weeks following this worship. The timing of death is one of those mysteries that goes unsolved. This service helps us prepare for that moment, whenever it might occur.

A message from the Worship Committee:

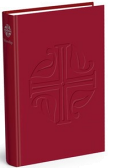
Our committee met on March 16th we picked hymns for April and talked about Holy week services as well as Easter.
